Sister Rose Thering Award for Outstanding Service to the Sister Rose Mission



REV. MSGR. C. ANTHONY ZICCARDI, S.T.D, S.S.L.

C. Anthony Ziccardi was born in Italy but grew up in New Jersey. Having graduated *summa cum laude* from Seton Hall with a B.A. in sociology and a Master of Divinity degree, he was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of Newark in 1990. Subsequently, he received a licentiate degree in Sacred Scripture (S.S.L., *magna cum laude*) from the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome and a doctoral degree in biblical theology (S.T.D., *summa cum laude*) from the Pontifical Gregorian University, also in Rome.

As an academic, he has taught biblical studies, biblical languages, and preaching on the faculty of Immaculate Conception Seminary at Seton Hall University from 1996 onwards. He was the Seminary's Associate Dean from 1998 to 2002. From October 2006 until September 2020, he served at first as Seton Hall's Executive Director and then as its Vice President for Mission and Ministry; simultaneously, he headed the University's Board Office as the Secretary Designee of the Board of Regents. From August 2010 to September 2020, he served as the Director of the Center for Vocation and Servant Leadership at Seton Hall. He is currently the Seminary's Coordinator for Undergraduate Admissions and Retention. His doctoral dissertation was published as a book under the title *The Relationship of Jesus and the Kingdom of God in Luke-Acts*, and his articles and book reviews have appeared in *The Princeton Seminary Bulletin, Chicago Studies, Homiletic and Pastoral Review, Biblica* and *The Catholic Biblical Quarterly*.

As a priest, he has served as personal secretary to the Archbishop of Newark and as pro-rector of Sacred Heart Cathedral Basilica in Newark. Since 1996, he has been a member of the Pastoral Council of Redemptoris Mater Archdiocesan Missionary Seminary. From 1996 to 1999, he served on the Archdiocese's Priestly Vocations Board and from 2014 to 2020 on the Priest Personnel Policy Board. Since 2002, he has served the Archdiocese as a *Censor Librorum*. He offers his pastoral services part-time to several Neocatechumenal Way communities in northern New Jersey, and to the parishes of St. Francis in Ridgefield Park and St. Anne in Fair Lawn, New Jersey. He also serves as spiritual director for several seminarians and priests. He was named a Chaplain to His Holiness Benedict XVI in March 2009.

From 2013 to the present, he has been a member of the Board of Trustees of the Sister Rose Thering Fund. From June 2019 to November 2020, he served as the Interim Executive Director of the Sister Rose Thering Fund.



Sister Rose Thering Fund Award for Outstanding Service in Education for Interveligious Harmony



RABBI NOAM MARANS

Rabbi Noam Marans is AJC's Director of Interreligious and Intergroup Relations, heading the agency's national interfaith outreach and advocacy. A recognized leader of Catholic-Jewish dialogue, he played a central role in celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the transformational *Nostra Aetate* document, delivering a keynote address at the official U.S. Catholic commemoration and participating in multiple audiences with Pope Francis. He has also expanded AJC's engagement with Muslims, Latino Evangelicals and Latter-day Saints, and leads efforts to turn back anti-Israel initiatives within Mainline Protestant denominations. He spearheaded AJC's constructive criticism of the controversial *Oberammergau Passion Play*, which resulted in mitigation of the production's anti-Jewish elements.

Before arriving at AJC in 2001, he served for sixteen years as rabbi of Temple Israel in Ridgewood, NJ. He earned a B.A. in political science at Columbia University and an M.A. and Rabbinical Ordination at the Jewish Theological Seminary, which has recognized him with an Honorary Doctorate for decades of service to the Jewish people. He is a past president of the Northern New Jersey Board of Rabbis and serves as chair of IJCIC, the International Jewish Committee for Interreligious Consultations.

THE SISTER ROSE THERING FUND for Education in Jewish-Christian Studies



The concept of teaching about interfaith relations in this Catholic university dates back to the arrival in 1953 of Monsignor John M. Oesterreicher, who established the Institute for Judaeo-Christian Studies at Seton Hall University in South Orange, NJ. Oesterreicher, a convert from Judaism to Catholicism in 1927, had been lecturing, conducting research and creating publications for 15 years when he sensed the need for a program coordinator to flesh out his work and bring his lessons to the wider community at Seton Hall. Thus, in 1968 he advertised for someone to fill this position. As fate would have it, Sister Rose Thering, O.P., Ph.D., with a background in education and Jewish-Christian Studies and a keen interest in the Jewish roots of Christianity and the State of Israel, responded to his ad and was hired for the position. Its tasks included organizing summer trips to Israel for teachers and lay persons to learn about the Holy Land. Called the Menorah Institute, the program's positive impact, both on Monsignor Oesterreicher and teachers, led to the establishment of a Master's degree program, directed by Father Lawrence Frizzell, now offered in the Department of Religion.

During the more than 30 years of her career as professor of higher education in the College of Education and Human Resources, Sister Rose continued to lead the Menorah Institute and became a close colleague of David M. Bossman, Ph.D., who had arrived at Seton Hall in 1985, served for a time as Provost and then as chair of the Department of Jewish-Christian Studies. Dr. Bossman and a group of close friends of Sister Rose wanted to offer teachers more courses in Jewish-Christian Studies, and eventually discussed the possibility of offering scholarships to teachers. The idea of developing a significant fund to help defray costs of tuition

led to the establishment in 1993 of such a fund and program. Originally called the Sister Rose Thering Endowment—later changed to the Sister Rose Thering Fund—it is overseen by an elected Board of Trustees who created a set of working by-laws.

In 1994, the State of New Jersey, then led by Governor Christine Todd Whitman, and urged on by Sister Rose and others, including former Governor Thomas H. Kean, signed into law a mandate to teach about the Holocaust and Genocide in all public schools in New Jersey, grades K-12. This law created the mandate and was bolstered by the message of Pope John Paul II to Catholic schools, *We Remember: A Reflection on the Shoah* (March 1998). Sister Rose became a founding member of the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education, charged to carry out the mandate, and served until her death in 2006.

Today, the Fund offers annual scholarships and has reached more than 400 educators during its existence. It raises funds through donations received primarily at the Evening of Roses, held each Spring, a program that has honored outstanding educators and individuals who have shown traits of compassion, altruism and courage in various endeavors. The Sister Rose Thering Fund and the graduate Program in Jewish-Christian Studies have been called "the hidden jewels" of Seton Hall University, but as Dr. Bossman has remarked, in reality they are "no longer hidden but treasures found" as the Fund contributes annually in scholarship funding to the University. Through advocacy and education, the Program continues to promote understanding and cooperation among Jews, Christians and people of other religious traditions.

This is my second semester participating in the Sister Rose Thering certification program, and I have entered an academic world where my eyes are opened and my mind is thinking in a way it hasn't in a long time. Not only am I able to learn more about the history of Jewish-Christian relationships but I am able to learn about different perspectives that touch on humanity and what it means to participate in the human experience. As a result, I am able to bring these new perspectives into my personal life and into my classroom. Some things I have been able to implement into my teaching from my Shoah Philosophy course are how to think and why thinking critically is important. I have learned in this course that one of the most problematic aspects of the Holocaust is the fact that so many bystanders were not able to think for themselves, or even took the time to really think about right and wrong in a critical way, and this resulted in the horror that was the Holocaust. I am able to take this lesson and share it with my students, in hopes that they are able to really understand the importance of practicing critical thinking skills. In addition, I am able to take some of the content I am learning in the grad courses and make clear connections to the content I am teaching in the classroom. For example, I have a broader insight into my teaching of Bernard Malamud's The Assistant, and Simon Wiesenthal's The Sunflower. This experience has been invaluable to the way I show up as a

person and as a teacher, and I look forward to what future courses have to teach me.




